**Goal for spiritual formation:** "Spiritual formation aims to arouse and animate true hunger for holiness, desire for union with the Father through Christ in the Spirit, daily growing in love of God and neighbor in life and ministry, and the practices of prayer and spirituality that foster these attitudes and dispositions. ### Guide to Lectio Divina

Choose a word or phrase of the Scriptures you wish to pray. It makes no difference which text is chosen, as long as you have no set goal of "covering" a certain amount of text. The amount of text covered is in God's hands, not yours.

- <u>**Read.**</u> Turn to the text and read it slowly, gently. Savor each portion of the reading, constantly listening for the "still, small voice" of a word or phrase that somehow says, "I am for you today." Do not expect lightning or ecstasies. In lectio divina, God is teaching us to listen, to seek him in silence. God does not reach out and grab us but gently invites us ever more deeply into his presence.
- <u>Ponder.</u> Take the word or phrase into yourself. Memorize it and slowly repeat it to yourself, allowing it to interact with your inner world of concerns, memories, and ideas. Do not be afraid of distractions. Memories or thoughts are simply parts of yourself that, when they rise up during lectio divina, are asking to be given to God along with the rest of your inner self. Allow this inner pondering, this rumination, to invite you into dialogue with God.
- <u>Pray.</u> Whether you use words, ideas, or images—or all three—is not important. Interact with God as you would with one who you know loves and accepts you. Give to God what you have discovered during your experience of meditation. Give to God what you have found within your heart.

It is not necessary to assess the quality of your lectio divina, as if you were "performing" or seeking some goal. Lectio divina has no goal other than that of being in the presence of God by praying the Scriptures.

## Teach Us to Pray: The Colloquy Fr. James Martin

To think of speaking with God as a friend may seem shocking. After all, God is the Creator of the universe. How could anyone approach God as a friend? But the idea of a friendship with God has a distinguished history in Catholic spirituality.

St. Ignatius Loyola, the sixteenth-century founder of the Jesuit Order, encouraged this practice in his Spiritual Exercises. At the close of many meditations, Ignatius suggests that we imagine ourselves speaking to Jesus "in the way one friend speaks to another . . . telling one's concerns and asking counsel." This form of prayer he calls a "colloquy," or "conversation." But note the stance Ignatius recommends: one friend to another.

Many believers engage in colloquies in a simple way: they picture Jesus in front of them, say, sitting in a chair. Then they pour out what they want to say in prayer. Your colloquy doesn't have to be only petitions. It could include thanks-giving. Or you can just let Jesus know what's going on in your life. Of course he knows already, but there is something con-soling about sharing yourself with Jesus in this way.

# Prayer: The Daily Examen

The Daily Examen is a technique of prayerful reflection on the events of the day in order to detect God's presence and discern his direction for us. The Examen is an ancient practice in the Church that can help us see God's hand at work in our whole experience.

The method presented here is adapted from a technique described by Ignatius Loyola in his <u>Spiritual Exercises</u>. St. Ignatius thought that the Examen was a gift that came directly from God, and that God wanted it to be shared as widely as possible. One of the few rules of prayer that Ignatius made for the Jesuit order was the requirement that Jesuits practice the Examen twice daily—at noon and at the end of the day. It's a habit that Jesuits, and many other Christians, practice to this day.

# How Can I Pray?

A great way to pray is to look for God's presence in your life. More than 400 years ago St. Ignatius Loyola encouraged prayer-filled mindfulness by proposing what has been called the Daily Examen. The Examen is a technique of prayerful reflection on the events of the day in order to detect God's presence and to discern his direction for us. Try this version of St. Ignatius's prayer.

1. Become aware of God's presence. Look back on the events of the day in the company of the Holy Spirit. The day may seem confusing to you—a blur, a jumble, a muddle. Ask God to bring clarity and understanding.

2. Review the day with gratitude. Gratitude is the foundation of our relationship with God. Walk through your day in the presence of God and note its joys and delights. Focus on the day's gifts. Look at the work you did, the people you interacted with. What did you receive from these people? What did you give them? Pay attention to small things—the food you ate, the sights you saw, and other seemingly small pleasures. God is in the details.

**3.** Pay attention to your emotions. One of St. Ignatius's great insights was that we detect the presence of the Spirit of God in the movements of our emotions. Reflect on the feelings you experienced during the day. Boredom? Elation? Resentment? Compassion? Anger? Confidence? What is God saying through these feelings? God will most likely show you some ways that you fell short. Make note of these sins and faults. But look deeply for other implications. Does a feeling of frustration perhaps mean that God wants you consider a new direction in some area of your work? Are you concerned about a friend? Perhaps you should reach out to her in some way.

4. Choose one feature of the day and pray from it. Ask the Holy Spirit to direct you to something during the day that God thinks is particularly important. It may involve a feeling—positive or negative. It may be a significant encounter with another person or a vivid moment of pleasure or peace. Or it may be something that seems rather insignificant. Look at it. Pray about it. Allow the prayer to arise spontaneously from your heart—whether intercession, praise, repentance, or gratitude.

**5. Look toward tomorrow.** Ask God to give you light for tomorrow's challenges. Pay attention to the feelings that surface as you survey what's coming up. Are you doubtful? Cheerful? Apprehensive? Full of delighted anticipation? Allow these feelings to turn into prayer. Seek God's guidance. Ask him for help and understanding. Pray for hope. Write down these prayers and reflections in a journal. A prayer journal can be very helpful for your continued prayer and further reflection.

St. Ignatius encouraged people to talk to Jesus like a friend. End the Daily Examen with a conversation with Jesus. Ask forgiveness for your sins. Ask for his protection and help. Ask for his wisdom about the questions you have and the problems you face. Do all this in the spirit of gratitude. Your life is a gift, and it is adorned with gifts from God.

End the Daily Examen with the Our Father.

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# HANDOUT 4 ~ THE CANTOR AS TEACHER ~ The 3 X 5 Method of Teaching New Music

**Preparation**: The Teaching Cantor determines and prepares an abbreviated outline written on a 3x5 card. The teaching should include 3 to 5 repetitions of the new music and take no longer than 3 to 5 minutes.

Include the following on the  $3 \times 5$  card:

- A. The style and wording of your assembly greeting.
- B. The directions for the assembly: hymnal and page number of the music. Indicate when it is sung in the liturgy.
- C. The rehearsal process: Decide what to rehearse and include the following:
  - Starting pitch(es) from accompanist.
  - Which musical segment the cantor sings (cantor sings a segment *a cappella* first, before the assembly). Determine the lengths of the phrases the cantor will use to teach the short segments of the piece.
  - Assembly's repeat of the segment with the cantor while accompanist plays a single melody line (in double octaves) to support their part.
  - The phrases the cantor will join together when singing the second time through the melody.
  - The number of times the cantor will repeat (3-5) the new melody with the assembly.
- D. Determine a signal for the accompanist that will indicate that the congregation has learned it well enough to add the full accompaniment to the assembly part.
- E. Affirm the assembly in their singing.
- F. Thank them for singing fully and actively!

### Sample Script

1. "Good Morning!"(pause)

2. "Before we begin our celebration, please turn to page \_\_\_\_\_ in your \_\_\_\_\_ hymnal. We will sing this gospel acclamation for the next few months, during the last weeks of Ordinary Time."

3. "When this is sung, it sounds like this." Cantor gets starting pitch, then sings a short segment a cappella.

4. "Please join me." Cantor leads the assembly in singing the segment with gesture and voice, while the accompanist supports their singing by playing the melody in unison double octaves on their part. Cantor repeats this procedure with each short segment of the melodic phrase.

5. Cantor returns to the beginning of the melodic line and sings two segments together *a cappella*. Cantor leads the assembly in singing the two segments with gesture and voice, while the accompanist supports them by playing the melody in unison double octaves. Cantor repeats this procedure until the whole melodic phrase has been sung.

6. Cantor sings the complete melodic phrase a cappella. Cantor leads the assembly in singing the complete melodic phrase with gesture and voice, while the accompanist supports the singing by playing the melody in unison double octaves. While saying, "Let's sing together!" Cantor then gestures for the assembly to repeat this melodic phrase again.

7. When the Cantor senses that the assembly is comfortable with the melody, the Cantor asks the accompanist to play the full accompaniment with them. Cantor gestures for them to sing it again. Cantor repeats this again if necessary.

8. If the assembly sings it well, encourage and affirm them. "That was beautiful." If necessary, invite them with, "Lovely, let's sing it again."

9. Encourage and affirm the assembly. "You sang that well. (Optional: You may want to place the ribbon in your hymnal at this page, in order to find it easily when we get to the Gospel Acclamation.) As the principal parish choir of the liturgy, you sound beautiful. Thank you."

Before and during the Gathering Rite, what do you notice from your place in the pew, from your ministry, from your place in the liturgy? how do you understand your role as a *Liturgical Assistant, Eucharistic Minister, Lectors, Music Minister, Sacristans, Hospitality Minister (Usher/Greeter), Collection Steward, or Dust Buster*, during this time of gathering...what do you see and what do you experience? As a

(ministry) what three to five practices will help you prepare your heart, mind, and spiritual presence to give your gift of praise and thanks to God at the Sunday Eucharist?

# WORD

As a <u>(ministry)</u> how do you hear, truly HEAR, the Word during the Liturgy? ....what helps you? ....what hinders you? What helps you make a spiritual connection to God's story and Word? What helps you make a connection from the Word to your own daily life? How do you respond to the Word? ...with a strong "Thanks be to God?"...with a full-throated and beautiful (or even strong but off-key) sung responsorial psalm refrain? How do you feel singing God's praise with an Alleluia while standing song or while trying to here and understand Jesus's words in the Gospel? Does your personal reaction to the scriptures have a different focus that the homilist? What come to mind as you are standing to profess your faith in the creed? What helps you to fully enter into the prayers and intercessions for the Church and the world? How does my inner response mirror my external response...or does it?

# **EUCHARIST**

How do I feel after hearing and processing all that the Eucharist gifts give? What do I have to give? What am I offering? What distractions keep me from offering? What do I see and hear and focus on? What words or songs attract my attention? What does that say to me? What is the lack that I need filled? Praise? Thanks? Praise? Thanks/ love? Care? Healing? Nurturing? Affirmation? What is the lack that I need filled? What can I give to God in the body of Christ? Praise! Love! Service! Thanks! Presence at times not all engaged..... but just being present.... is that enough? How much is enough? What is in my attention during the Eucharistic prayer? what are my distractions? Can the distractions draw me to God? Is God in the distractions? Why sometimes a loud response? What happens when at times response remains silent?

# COMMUNION

What do I receive? How do I receive? Processing to see what gives me the deepest sense of the holy during communion? How does my singing at communion affect my experience of Jesus? Do I feel one with the body of Christ? do I feel alone in devotion to Jesus after receiving? How can I experience personal and communal experience of the body of Christ? Where are my distractions or my consolations?

After communion... the announcements, How do these perfect? Prayer after communion.....how does that affect the sending forth right? eexit sign is a symbol for what? how do I carry the Eucharist with me home? to work? In my family? In my neighborhood? In my daily living? How do I live the Eucharist? Suffering, death, and resurrection of Jesus is the pschal ,mystery! What do I need to suffer in to draw me closer to Jesus? 40 days in the desert? Persecution? Questioning in front of others? Interrogation? What do I need to die to, in my ministry? Old habits? Lack of openness? Expectations? Lack of intentional preparation? Shall I prepare as if this is the most important hour of everyone's life? I am responsible to be the best I can be! If I forget to be at my best I might approach liturgy with a lack of attention...a lack of self-reflection? A lack of empathy? A need for better listening? Can I avoid the myopic focus on self, drowning out the need and cries of the hearts of others? Do I notice the holy moments in this worship? ....The amazing and beautiful Images? Am I living out my week to bring all that I am to the next Sunday Eucharist? ...The summit to which my life flows? Do I bring all of my week's work and play as a gift offering to God on Sunday? ...is if I am saying he is here, NOW? And I offer myself to God ...here I am? What can be a set of goals and reminders that are touchstones for Eucharistic presence for each minister.

  - Detachment...from joys to sufferings let nothing mean more or less.... it is all gift!
  - The Word, Scripture...5 minutes before bed. EXPERIENCE THE MIRACLE OF Five MINUTES WITH GOD –
  - Wonder and Awe... transfigure our world...see through a child's eye!

4. Encounter God in scripture.

- Use scripture from the readings of the liturgical year. Become familiar with the liturgical calendar. Enter into the spirit of the text and scriptures of the Mass.
- Pray with the text of the Sunday liturgy.
  - Read Gospel first
  - o Read First Reading
  - Read/Sing the Responsorial Psalm.
    - How does it connect?
    - Why these verses?
    - Why this refrain?
    - Who is speaking to whom? Does this speak to me today?
- When you do this study and prayer, it can touch your heart, and you can communicate that message of God's love. (But even if you are in a dry spell, trust that the Holy Spirit will use you.)
- Living your daily life with the text of the psalm resonating in your heart will allow you to express the psalms out of lived experience. Let this daily practice help you prepare well for your Sunday ministry.

5. Use "Lectio Divina": a specific method of reading, meditation, prayer and contemplation, of which in September 2005, <u>Pope Benedict XVI</u> stated:

"I would like in particular to recall and recommend the ancient tradition of *Lectio divina*: the diligent reading of Sacred Scripture accompanied by prayer brings about that intimate dialogue in which the person reading hears God who is speaking, and in praying, responds to him with trusting openness of heart. If it is effectively promoted, this practice will bring to the Church - I am convinced of it - a new spiritual springtime."

# D. Practical Formation of the Cantor and Psalmist:

Develop your vocal, musical and communication skills so that all have sufficient confidence in your abilities, allowing all to maintain focus on the liturgy.

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# HANDOUT 3 - VOCAL TECHNIQUES FOR CANTORS AND SINGERS

# SOME GENERAL PRINCIPLES

- Vocalization is necessary for the instrument to be released; activated, stretched and trained (we are athletes!)
- Each vocalization should have a specific goal; no time for mindless activity
- 10-15 minutes daily is a good start
- Engage the body in vocalization
- Exercises should begin in the middle register; then explore the extremes
- Engage the light singing mechanism first and work it down vowels only
- Warm up the emotions

# VOCAL MECHANICS OF SINGING

# I. POSTURE/BODY POSITION

- Tall, erect posture "royalty"
- Feet are grounded and not more than shoulder width apart; one foot slightly ahead of the other, weight on the forward foot
- Knees are relaxed and not locked; use glutes to hold yourself up
- Aware of spinal support upward stretch
- Chest is elevated and chin tucked into chest; arched; balance head on the neck
- Face, jaw, tongue, lips relaxed
- Eye focus
- Arms relaxed and hanging at the sides of the body

# II. BREATHING (BODY)

# Inhalation

- Fill in an imaginary inner tube around the waist
- Suck in through a straw
- Series of sniffs
- Imagine a belt of noses around the waist and breath in
- "Home Alone" astonishment
- Rhythmic breathing on a set of sniffs increase the number
- Rhythmic breathing on a selected consonant, i.e. t or d
- Inhalation from both the nose and the mouth
- We feel the air enter from the naval point; the diaphragm lowers as the intercostal muscles stretch outward
- Avoid tightening the stomach muscles
- We should study our anatomy and know what body parts are involved in the process of singing

# Exhalation

- Blow out candles one at a time
- Slow, leaking sound
- Fix on a spot on the wall (laser beam)
- After the lungs have filled, the resistance must begin; we hold back the air
- Do not let the lungs completely empty before taking the next breath
- Let in, set, spin
- Exercises: Lip Trills, i.e. motorboat, staccato and pulsed exercises

# III. RESONANCE (HEAD)

- Physiology includes tongue, jaw, lips, mouth, palates, nasal/sinus cavities, eyes
- Yawn-sigh
- Relaxation of jaw; blah, blah, blah
- Raising the soft palate
- Sound rides on well-shaped vowels
- Italian vowel sounds are most effective for singing (they can be shaped to fit any style of music
  - AH (A) as in father
  - EH (E) as in fed
  - EE (I) as in feet
  - OH (O) as in fought
  - OO (U) as in food
- Fish face
- Inner smile
- Breath of clean air
- Dipthongs
- Working the passagio

# **IV. RANGE**

- Think like an operatic singer "I love to sing" on 5-8-5-3-1
- Exercises that encompass a large scale range

# V. ARTICULATION

- Consonants should be short and crisp move quickly to the vowel sound
- Relaxation of tongue, teeth and lips

# VI. SINGING HEALTH/LESSONS/TEACHERS

- Best resource for singing teachers is the National Association of Teachers of Singing (NATS)
- Be a wise consumer; know what you expect from a teacher; hold an audition
- Difference between teacher and coach
- Determine a period of study
- Practice, practice, practice

  - Is my heart open to the guidance of the Holy Spirit?
  - Will I allow myself to listen with my entire being, or trust only worldly senses?

  - Receive the sign of the cross on your ears, that you may hear the voice of the Lord.

  - Receive the sign of the cross on your feet that you may walk in the way of Christ.
